DEUTERONOMY 7-9

Please turn in your Bibles this evening to Deuteronomy chapter 7 as we continue our study through the Word of God.

We are presently in the longest of Moses' three sermons, covering from Deuteronomy 4:44 through Deuteronomy 26:19.

In this section Moses is dealing with the moral and legal aspects of their walk with the Lord as they prepare to enter the Promise Land. How they were to conduct themselves as they entered in. This next generation was being prepared to enter into the Promise Land!

And to explain this Moses gives them examples from the past, their failures, what they are not to do so they will learn the lesson and live lives that would honor God.

Specifically, here in Deuteronomy chapter 7, we will see Moses instruct them in what they were to do when they entered the Promise Land. How they were to separate themselves from the enemy, destroy the enemy or the enemy will destroy you!

With that said, let's begin reading in Deuteronomy chapter 7, starting in verse 1 and see what the Lord has for us as we study His Word.

DEUTERONOMY 7

VERSES 1-5

As Moses speaks to the children of Israel, he does so in such a way that it sounds like a done deal, the Promise Land is theirs before they even step in, before they even enter it.

How could Moses speak so confidently about something that has not taken place yet?

Because his words are based in the promises of God and the faithfulness of God, and that is the only reason he could say it like he did.

And listen to what he tells them. Moses tells them that these nations are stronger, mightier than they are. That was true. But the bigger picture was not the strength of the children of Israel, but the strength of the Lord who was going to give them this victory. The enemy is not stronger than our God and that is something we need to remember as we go through tough battles, face difficult situations. He will see us through, He is God!

Think of it like this in our own lives. He saved us, He is sanctifying us, and one day we will be taken to glory but when God speaks of these things in our lives, He speaks of them as if they have already taken place.

How can He do that?

Because He is God and His promises are sure, for what He has promised He is more than able to bring to pass!

Listen to how sure our God is in regard to our salvation, that once we come to Christ, accept Him as our Lord and Savior, it is a done deal!

In Romans 8:30 we are told, "Moreover whom He predestined, these He also called; whom He called, these He also justified; and whom He justified, these He also glorified."

I want to focus here on the final step of the sanctification process. This occurs when we go to be with the Lord and yet Paul states this work, by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, is in the past tense – *THESE HE ALSO GLORIFIED!*

Why does Paul speak of something that has not happened as if it already did?

Because that is how sure it is, God will complete the work He started because He foreknew us!

It is as Jesus said in John 6:37, "All that the Father gives Me will come to Me, and the one who comes to Me I will by no means cast out."

And in John 18:9 we are told by Jesus, "... 'Of those whom You gave Me I have lost none.'"

If you are His, He will not lose you – it is a promise – you are already seen as glorified in the Father's eyes – that is how certain it is, that is how secure we are in our eternal redemption!

Now here in Deuteronomy the children of Israel are being told to destroy the inhabitants of the land, to wipe them out. That seems harsh but you have to understand the depravity of these people, the Canaanites.

Keep in mind that God gave them 400 years to repent, and they refused and thus, His judgment is coming upon them shortly.

And the reality is, they were going to destroy themselves and before they could infect and destroy anyone else, God was going to destroy them!

We need to understand this, or we might come to the conclusion that God is not being fair. This radical, complete destruction was important because of the depraved nature of the worship of the Canaanites, who worshipped male and female gods of sex and who practiced human sacrifice with their own children.

You see, if they were not destroyed, the children of Israel would be infected with this sin, they would worship these gods and move away from the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob!

God warns us today to separate ourselves from the world. But many of us, truth be told, simply do not want to completely destroy the sins which keep us from God's Promised Land of blessing and peace – we want to weaken them, and have some control over them, but we do not want to – *UTTERLY DESTROY THEM!*

Here's the thing. When it came to idolatry – its adherents, its images, its altars – God expected Israel to have a policy of zero tolerance.

But why was this so important?

I know we covered this a little but listen to what Moses says next.

VERSES 6-8

First of all, we see that they were to be a holy people, or a people set apart unto God alone. And please understand that God didn't choose Israel because they were so good, they had large numbers, or whatever.

The only reason God chose Israel is because He wanted to, He loves them.

That should sound familiar to us because God did not choose me or choose you because you are such a great person. He chose you for one reason – *HE LOVES YOU!*

That is what John tells us in I John 4:19, "We love Him because He first loved us."

That should help keep us humble!

Now, as we have read in previous verses, they were not to intermarry and please understand we are not talking about interracial marriages here. How people came to that conclusion, that line of reasoning is beyond me. The only difference is the amount of pigment in our skin; we have all been created in the image of God, *PERIOD!*

The issue here is coming together with an unbeliever in marriage, with an unsaved person. They were not to do this. They were to be holy people and the same is true for us.

You are not to be unequally yoked because chances are, they will pull you down, away from God instead of you bringing them to God in this relationship.

VERSES 9-11

God is going to use the children of Israel as His instrument of judgment upon the Canaanites for their hatred of Him, for their rebellion against Him and their refusal to repent, to turn to Him!

VERSES 12-16

The Lord is telling them that He will bless them if they are obedient to His Words, but if they are not, if they don't deal with the enemy and destroy them, they will become a snare to the children of Israel.

As we move on into the book of Joshua, we see their failure of obeying the Lord completely and they leave some of the enemy in the Promise Land.

Then, as we get to the book of Judges, we see the results of leaving the enemy in the Land, how they inflicted their sin into the lives of the children of Israel, and it brought about death and destruction.

God wanted them to have that abundant life, but they refused to obey. And the same is true for us. If we don't deal with this, separate ourselves from it, we too will become infected with its poison, and it will destroy our lives and we should not be surprised when it does happen. God has warned us.

God says what He means and means what He says, and we need to listen and obey. God knows what He is talking about!

VERSES 17-24

Here we see God, once again, instruct them through Moses that if they are fearful of the enemy who is before them, remember what God has done in the past to give them the assurance to forge ahead in the present battle they are facing.

Past victories because of God's faithfulness will give us much assurance in the current struggles we face, because God is faithful.

I think that is an important lesson for us to learn. As we face these giant problems in our lives, it can become overwhelming. The solution to that problem of fear, of being overwhelmed is remembering what God has done in the past, how He delivered you from past battles and that will help with the present one you are facing.

As He told the children of Israel, He will go ahead and fight for them just as He will do for us. All we need to do is walk by faith and see the salvation that He will bring to our lives!

Also, God will drive out the enemy a little at a time, not all at once so that as one enemy is driven out, they could possess the land.

He does the same with us. Can you imagine if He drove out every enemy once we got saved!

We would be prideful, arrogant, and we would not have compassion for others who are going through difficult times.

And the biggest issue, if those are not enough, is that we would not have to trust in the Lord! Spiritual growth is truly a process! And I guess I should say that it is a lifelong process!

VERSES 25-26

In other words, keep your life pure; don't bring in things that will cause you or your family to stumble in their walk with the Lord.

What a great lesson for us to follow. To remove those things that will be a snare to your life and will eventually take you captive!

Evangelist, Billy Sunday, once said, "I'm against sin. I'll kick it as long as I've got a foot, and I'll fight it as long as I've got a fist. I'll butt it as long as I've got a head. I'll bite it as long as I've got a tooth. When I'm old and fist-less and footless and toothless, I'll gum it till I go home to glory and it goes home to perdition!"

This is not a joke. God is very serious here just as He was with the Children of Israel, but they didn't listen. May we listen to what the Lord is saying.

We are to hate sin and love God – both are needed to live a victorious Christian life.

Listen carefully to these words from Paul as he wrote to the Thessalonians, "<u>Test all</u> things; hold fast what is good. Abstain from every form of evil. Now may the God of peace

Himself sanctify you completely; and may your whole spirit, soul, and body be preserved

blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. He who calls you is faithful, who also will do it." I Thessalonians 5:21-24.

May we not forget that!

DEUTERONOMY 8

VERSES 1-2

The call once again is to obey the Lord, to walk as He leads.

You see, those 40 years in the wilderness God was still leading them, sustaining them, to keep them dependent upon Him by humbling them.

The problem comes as we are in the midst of a trial that we face, and we forget the Lord, we forget about what He has done in the past and then we lose sight of what God is doing in the present.

You see, God is not testing us so that He can know what is in our hearts, He already knows. He is testing us to show us what is in our hearts!

Now here's the thing. God tests us to help us to grow, while Satan tempts us to sin, to cause us to fall away from God.

Thus, as you go through a test, a trial, don't let Satan rip you off but let God help you to grow!

God wants us to be in that place where we will trust in Him knowing He is leading all the way!

But keep in mind, the test and the trial are the same event, but leading you in different directions!

VERSES 3-5

We might say that the children of Israel were being educated by God but to be teachable, you need to be humble, you need to be open to what God is teaching you and you need to understand that you don't know better than God!

That is just plain pride on your part if you think you know better than God and you are setting yourself up for a fall!

And here's the thing. God loves you and because He loves you, He will discipline you when He has to. If He didn't love you, He would do nothing!

Don't be surprised when it happens. Chalk it up to God's love for you. It means you're His kid. God is faithful to discipline us.

Now, look at how this played out, how God was teaching them.

God first allowed them to be hungry, some 2 to 3 million people in the wilderness without a grocery store nearby. And one grocery store would not be of any help either!

Then the Lord fed them, teaching them to trust in Him even when and especially when the situation seems hopeless from a human perspective.

Also, in those 40 years their clothes did not wear out, their feet did not swell, and their shoes did not wear out. God took care of them and in a powerful way. If God cares that much about what you eat, about the clothes you wear, the shoes you wear, even your feet, God will also sustain you through everything that comes your way. Maybe not the way you think, but He will do it!

And make no mistake about it, we need physical bread for our physical body to be healthy and strong, but it does not end there.

We also need spiritual food to help keep our spiritual life healthy and strong.

What is that spiritual food we are to partake of?

The Bread of Life, Jesus Christ and He is the Word! Thus, we need to feast upon the Word of God so that we may grow.

Listen to the following statements that Spurgeon made regarding the Word of God. He wrote,

"You have never received spiritual life by your own feelings. It was when you believed God's Word that you lived; and you will never get an increase of spiritual life, and grow in grace, by your own feelings or your own doings. It must still be by your believing the promises and feeding on the Word."

He also wrote, "In places where they cut diamonds, they sweep up the dust, because the very dust of diamonds is valuable; and in the Word of God, all the truth is so precious that the very tiniest truth, if there be such a thing, is still diamond dust, and is unspeakably precious."

Even the diamond dust of God's Word is valuable to the seeker.

And finally, he wrote, "Oh, keep to the Word, my brothers! Keep to it as God's Word, and as coming out of his mouth. Suck it down into your soul; you cannot have too much of it. Feed on it day and night, for thus will God make you to live the life that is life indeed."

Paul put it like this in Hebrews 4:12-13, "For the word of God is living and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the division of soul and spirit, and of joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. And there is no creature hidden from His sight, but all things are naked and open to the eyes of Him to whom we must give account."

And The Amplified Bible puts it like this, "For the Word that God speaks is alive and full of power [making it active, operative, energizing, and effective]; it is sharper than any two-edged sword, penetrating to the dividing line of the breath of life (soul) and [the immortal] spirit, and of joints and marrow [of the deepest parts of our nature], exposing and sifting and analyzing and judging the very thoughts and purposes of the heart. And not a creature exists that is concealed from His sight, but all things are open and exposed, naked and defenseless to the eyes of Him with Whom we have to do."

The bottom line is this. If you truly believe what the Lord is saying, if you have tasted and seen that the Lord is good, you will obey Him.

That is what the Lord is saying here to the children of Israel. Look at what He has done for them and now, walk with Him as He is leading!

VERSES 6-10

Why does Moses keep repeating these things over and over again?

The same reason that we tell our children the same thing over and over again – so they will learn the lesson.

God needs to drive that point home, that He will bring them into the land of promise and when they are there, they need to remember to bless the Lord for all He has done.

It is the same lesson Jesus spoke of in Matthew 6:33, "But seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you."

In other words, you need to focus on God, upon what His Word is teaching you and let Him take care of the material things! Don't lose the perspective that God is in control.

It doesn't mean we don't work, that we just sit back and wait for God to provide, but we don't lose sleep over issues in our lives as we do work, for God will take care of us!

Just a little side note here. "The reference to iron and copper in the hills is remarkably exact. Ancient copper mines and smelters have been discovered in recent years in the Arabah below the Dead Sea, and geological survey has demonstrated the presence of ores of copper and iron in the nearby hills." (Thompson)

Now, with all the blessings that God is giving the children of Israel, listen to the warning He now gives them.

VERSES 11-17

Here is a powerful warning, not only for the children of Israel, but also for us.

When they enter into the Promise Land, when things are going well, when they have all the material blessings they could ask for, don't forget the Lord and come to the conclusion that you have done all of this, you have brought this about in your life!

How easy it was for them to forget how God brought them through the wilderness, all that He had done and was doing for them.

In Hosea 13:6 we see this played out once again as we are told, "When they had pasture, they were filled; They were filled and their heart was exalted; Therefore they forgot Me."

In Israel today they have forgotten how the Lord has sustained them and brought them back into the land of promise.

For almost 2,000 years they were without a homeland and on the heels of Adolph Hitler wiping them out, God brought them into the land of Israel once again, just as He promised them.

Today in Israel, over 100 million enemies surround them on three sides with the Mediterranean Sea on the other side. And yet, God has sustained them.

But they have forgotten the Lord; they are proud. They believe they have done this through their military might, their ingenuity, and their strength.

How sad when everywhere you look in Israel you see the hand of God upon His people!

But they have forgotten the Lord, most of the nation does not even believe in the Lord!

Before you come down too hard on them, where are you in regard to blessing the Lord, remembering all He has done for you?

You see, in times of prosperity, when things are going well, we do tend to forget about the Lord, that He has done it, that He is sustaining us, and instead of remembering Him, we lift ourselves up, and that is just plain pride!

Here's the thing. If you obey the Words of God, as the Lord was instructing them to do, you won't go astray, you won't forget the Lord!

That is what Moses is going to say as we read on.

VERSE 18

Here it is, *REMEMBER THE LORD*; He is the one who has given you the ability to do these things; and it is all being done to fulfill the covenant He made with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

It really is no different for us. We too need to *REMEMBER THE LORD*; He is the one who has given us the ability to do things; and it is all being done to further His eternal purposes, to further His Kingdom and not ours!

Don't be so enamored with the *gifts* that you forget the *Giver*.

VERSES 19-20

What was going to bring them into captivity?

Pride would be their downfall. As they forget about the Lord, their focus would be upon themselves and as they focused upon themselves, they would be inclined to worship other gods.

It is as Proverbs 16:18 tells us, "Pride goes before destruction, And a haughty spirit before a fall."

How true that is!

Listen to what one person said regarding this issue. He said,

We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of heaven; we have been preserved these many years in peace and prosperity; we have grown in numbers, wealth, and power as no other nation has ever grown. But we have forgotten God. We have forgotten the gracious hand which preserved us in peace and multiplied and enriched and strengthened us, and we have vainly imagined, in the deceitfulness of our hearts, that all these blessings were produced by some superior wisdom and virtue of our own. Intoxicated with unbroken success, we have become too self-sufficient to feel the necessity of redeeming and preserving grace, too proud to pray to the God that made us.

- A. Lincoln, Proclamation of a day of National Humiliation, Fasting and Prayer, 1863

Abraham Lincoln said that prayer, made these statements on the *Proclamation of a day* of *National Humiliation, Fasting and Prayer* back in 1863!

Can you imagine what Abraham Lincoln would be praying for today for our nation?

Today, God is truly out of the picture in this nation and look at the bondage we are in. We think that we have all this freedom, but the reality is, we are in bondage to the things of this world because we have turned away from God, we have forgotten Him.

And when you think about it, we are like Israel. We think that we have done all this, we have accomplished all this instead of seeing how God has blessed this nation.

It is as proverbs 14:34 tells us, "Righteousness exalts a nation, But sin is a reproach to any people."

May we return to the Lord, individually and as a nation. May we remember all He has done for us and is doing for us before His judgment comes!

DEUTERONOMY 9

VERSES 1-2

Here we are some 40 years later and there are still giants in the land, the nations are still strong, the cities are still fortified and now the Lord, through Moses, is reminding them of the situation they were about to face as they are on the boarder of the Promise Land preparing to enter in.

There was no way Israel could do this in the flesh, or their own strength. God commanded them to do something that was just beyond their ability to do themselves.

Why did the Lord do this when it seems to be some very discouraging words?

Let's read on and see because I believe the next verse tells us the reason.

If you think about it, this is not a great pep talk. Not yet!

VERSE 3

Notice the difference maker – *THE LORD!*

The enemy was still strong but don't focus on the enemy, focus on the Lord because it is the Lord who will give you the victory. That is what He is trying to teach them.

It is as Proverbs 21:31 tells us, "The horse is prepared for the day of battle, But deliverance is of the Lord."

You can gather together all the military might you want, but unless you are with the Lord; your strength is futile in the end. God can give victory to one man over 1,000 because the battle is His!

The battle always belongs to the Lord; He would give them victory just as He wants to do with us. All they needed to do and all we need to do for that victory is to be obedient to the Lord and walk by faith!

Then and only then would the enemy be driven out!

What we see here is Divine Sovereignty and human agency working side-by-side!

How true that is in our own lives. The enemy is big, the enemy is strong, but the battle belongs to the Lord and thus, may we walk by faith and see the salvation that He will bring to the situation that we are facing. But apart from Christ we will never achieve the victory that God desires in our lives.

God wants us to partner with Him in these battles understanding that He gives the victory.

Paul put it like this in II Corinthians 6:1, "We then, as workers together with Him also plead with you not to receive the grace of God in vain."

Again, Divine Sovereignty is working side-by-side with human agency, you and me!

VERSES 4-6

Why was God giving the children of Israel the land of Canaan?

We see three reasons here.

The first is because of the wickedness of those who were living in the land at that time.

Now some may get mad over this, they can't believe that they deserved this punishment.

I mean really, were they that bad?

Yes, they were, and God did give them 400 years to repent before His judgment came upon them, but they did not and became more and more wicked.

According to Archaeologist William F. Albright, in his book *From the Stone Age to Christianity*, he describes what the primary focus of Canaanite religion was: sex. The featured idols recovered by archaeologists are hundreds of nude female forms in sexually suggestive forms, as well as male idols associated with homosexual cults (From the Stone Age to Christianity, pages 232-235).

He wrote, "Thus the Canaanites, with their orgiastic nature-worship, their cult of fertility in the form of serpent symbols and sensuous nudity, and their gross mythology, were replaced by Israel." (Albright, page 281).

Secondly *God promised Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob this land* and God will not go back on His Word. What He has promised He is faithful and just to bring it to pass.

We are told in Numbers 23:19, "God is not a man, that He should lie, Nor a son of man, that He should repent. Has He said, and will He not do? Or has He spoken, and will He not make it good?"

And thirdly, *it was all based on the grace of God*. They did not deserve the land of Canaan, they were stiff-necked, rebellious and yet God gave it to them, He gave them that which they didn't deserve, the Promise Land!

VERSE 7

The key here is to -REMEMBER!

Don't forget the past, how you rebelled against the Lord, Moses is telling them.

As we forget the past, what we were like, pride can set in and that is never good.

Learn the lesson so you don't have to repeat it! Israel needed to understand their weaknesses so they would trust in the Lord, and we must also learn that lesson.

If you doubt that, if you think you can do it on your own, you are in control, look out!

Paul gives us a similar reminder in I Corinthians 10:12, "Therefore let him who thinks

he stands take heed lest he fall."

The Amplified Bible puts this verse like this, "Therefore let anyone who thinks he stands [who feels sure that he has a steadfast mind and is standing firm], take heed lest he fall [into sin]."

May we heed the warning!

<u>VERSES 8-21</u>

Keep in mind that they are all under the age of 60 except for Joshua, Caleb and Moses.

The older generation died out in the wilderness in unbelief and Moses wants this younger generation, the next generation to remember what happened at Mount Sinai with the golden calf as Moses went up to be with the Lord and get the Commandments of God.

These are the same people who said that they would obey the Lord, follow Him and yet, as Moses was up those 40 days on Mount Sinai the people got tired of waiting and demanded Aaron to make them an idol to worship God by!

And it was not only that, but they were also involved in immoral sexual behavior as they worshiped this golden calf and God was angry with them!

He tells Moses to get down from this mountain and take care of *HIS* people. I like that, God gives them to Moses here and tells him to take care of them!

Now, who was the first person to break all 10 Commandments at the same time?

No, it was not the children of Israel, but it was Moses as he threw them to the ground, and they broke in pieces.

Now, why did Moses do that?

I believe he was showing them that just as he broke them on the ground, it was in response to what they were doing.

And Moses was afraid, exceedingly afraid because He knew the holiness of God and the sin of the people and the two don't mix, they don't go together.

Thus, Moses intercedes for the people, for the nation another 40 days on Mount Sinai but not only for the nation, but also for Aaron, but why?

Because Aaron was to lead the people and when they wanted an idol to worship God by, he made it for them. And when Moses confronted him on this he basically said, "Moses, you won't believe me if I told you! We threw the gold into the fire and presto, out came this golden calf!"

And Moses basically said, "I don't believe it?"

And God was angry with Aaron for his sin and lying and was ready to destroy Aaron, but Moses once again interceded for Aaron and God spared him.

Moses then destroyed this golden calf showing it was nothing, it was not God, and it was not to be used to worship the true and living God by!

VERSES 22-24

Moses now recounts their rebellion at various places in this journey to Kadesh Barnea, the boarder of the Promise Land.

At Taberah, which means, "burning" we saw how the fire of the Lord consumed some of the children of Israel for their complaints and this is found in Numbers chapter 11.

Next there was Massah, which means, "tempted" because here they complained that there was no water, doubting God's love and care for them and this is found in Exodus 17:7.

Then there was Kibroth Hattaavah, which means, "graves of cravings." Here they complained that they wanted meat instead of the manna that God was providing for them.

And God did give them meat to eat till it was coming out of their nostrils! And many of them died here.

They got what the craved for, but God sent them a leanness of soul, spiritually speaking they were starving even though their flesh was fed. And this is found in Numbers chapter 11.

And finally, at Kadesh Barnea, on the boarder of the Promise Land, the 10 of the 12 spies gave the children of Israel a bad report regarding the Promise Land, discouraging the people from entering in by faith. And this is found in Numbers chapters 13 and 14.

What is the point here?

I believe it is this. If you do not believe God's love for you, that He does love you, like the children of Israel, you will be disobedient to His Word, to His calling in your life, just as Israel was!

VERSES 25-29

I like what Moses does here. God said earlier to Moses that the children of Israel were his people and now Moses turns it around, "No Lord, they are Your people!"

Kind of a hot potato!

Why did Moses do this?

It wasn't that he didn't love them, he did. But he also knew that God loved them more than he ever could. Thus, God not only loved them but was more than able to work in their lives more than Moses could ever do!

How true that is for us in regard to our unsaved family members, our unsaved friends, those who are not walking with the Lord. We love them very much and we want them to come to the Lord or return to the Lord, but we must also remember that God loves them more than we could ever love them, and He will be able to accomplish in their lives more than we ever could. Thus, we must give them to the Lord!

Not that we should not share the Lord with them, but understand the Lord loves them and is drawing them.

Also, notice the prayer of Moses here. Moses is asking for God to be merciful on the children of Israel, but why?

He wants God to be merciful upon Israel:

- > Because of God's past faithfulness to them.
- > Because of His past faithfulness to our forefathers.
- > Because of His own glory and reputation among the nations.
- > Because they are His people.

The same is true for us when you think about it.

We should ask God to be merciful to us as He was and is with Israel:

- > Because of God's past faithfulness to us.
- **Because of His past faithfulness to our forefathers.**
- > Because of His own glory and reputation among the nations.
- **Because** we are His people.

It is as Moses said, "Yet they are Your people and Your inheritance, whom You

brought out by Your mighty power and by Your outstretched arm." Deuteronomy 9:29.

God has saved us, He is sanctifying us, and He will bring us to glory one day, not because what we have done, but what He has done and is doing and will do in our lives.

May we not forget that!
